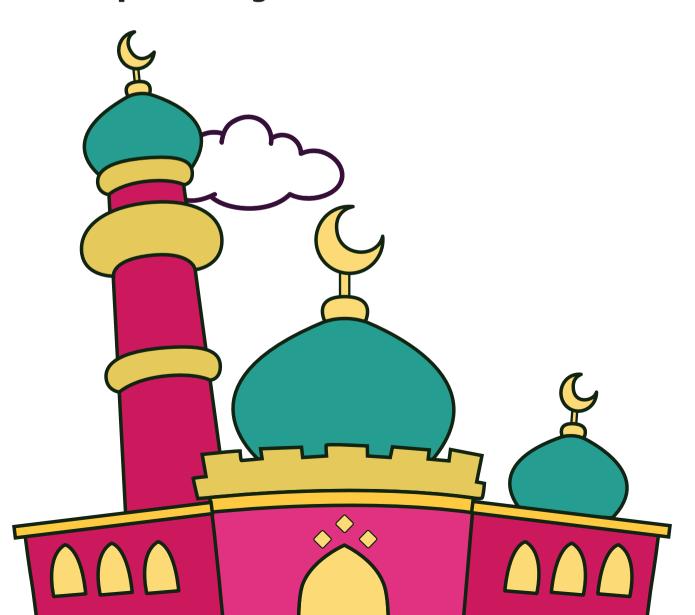

Preparatory "Sabilouna": Elements of the book

The book consists of **eight educational units**, in addition to a special section on preparation and discovery at the beginning of the academic year. Each unit consists of an array of materials. Some of these are taught on a regular basis such as The Holy Qur'an and other items as they are taught alternatively with other as they will be explained in detail in the **"Unit Guide"**.

Our Parth starts here

For **preparatory level** learners, this book represents the first 'encounter' with an Islamic education course. We aim to make this encounter a success and to attract young learners to the different components of the series contents such as the Holy Quran, ethics, rituals and beliefs without feeling alienated. Moreover, we aim to make young learners feel at ease and to be proud to belong to a wonderful religion (Islam) whose worshippers are all over the world coming from various racial, ethnic and linguistic backgrounds.

To achieve all these aims and objectives, we have thought it would best to pave the way for this relationship between young learners and Islam through a selection of common images, vocabulary, and expressions deemed familiar to Muslim children, so that they become accustomed to them and begin with ease and steady steps on the "Sabilouna / Our Path" journey of Islamic education and its various stages: basics, **characteristics and practical behavior**.

The Holy Qur'an is our Path

In contrast to previous books in the field of Islamic education, we have adopted a new distribution of the Surats of the Holy Qur'an, we have programmed eight(8) Surats to be memorized by young learners at the preparatory stage.

Al-Fatihah - An-Nas - Al-Falaq - Al-Ikhlas - Al-Masad - An-Nasr - Al-Kafirun - Al-Kawthar. We have opted for focusing on the basic meanings without getting into the details to explain the words so that the learner would be better able to comprehend and assimilate them. We have also been keen develop a well-studied cognitive and mental methodology that takes the learners through regular stages that help them smoothly move from understanding and drawing lessons to memorization.

Our Path to Islamic Ethics

The section is related to the Islamic and universal values that we want to instill in children. A good deed is the act of doing well of all kinds, the act of benefiting people, the act of being kind to them, and the act of mastering religious and worldly work. In terms of ethics, the topics that concern children are numerous and diverse. They include **uprightness**, **love**, **honesty**, **cleanliness**, **respect and kindness to one's parents**. They are important subjects that include a combination of syntheses between Islamic and civil education, between the idea of the "**good child**" (from the point of view of Islam) and the "**good citizen**" (from the civil point of view).

The section contains new approaches that provide references and advice with a direct impact on the behavior of young learners.

Methodologically, we have chosen for the learners to go through the stages of discovering the Islamic and civil values, memorizing the quranic verse or Hadith in which the value is included, understanding it, learning a lesson, taking them into account, then remembering and acting on the value.

Our Path to worship

At the preparatory level, we have decided to present the pillars of Islam indirectly. This is accompanied by information supported by statements

(Qur'an - Hadith – wise saying – advice...) with the adoption of regular stages: understanding, drawing lessons, memorizing, remembering and acting.

Our Path to Beliefs

In this section, the children at the preparatory level learn sayings that embody the nature of the relationship with Allah in terms of thanks, praise, glorification, and seeking forgiveness: "In the name of Allah", "Praise be to Allah", "I ask forgiveness from Allah", "Glory be to Allah", "Allah is the greatest"... along with the applications and drills that accompany that... At the preparatory level, learners alternate between beliefs and supplications.

Our Path in religion and language

"I am learning about my religion and my language": This is a new section that has not been included in any of our previous courses. For those who use the Arabic language series (mainly the Learn and Master), this part provides an opportunity to consolidate the output of the Arabic language lessons through a range of educational positions, activities, and exercises related to the religious materials taught to learners. Therefore, the output of the Arabic lessons (speaking, reading, and writing...) are reviewed and consolidated during the Islamic education class by adopting religious words and contents in a way that enhances the output of religion and language and the relationship between them.

Our Path is in stories, prayers and chants

We have made sure that the books for young learners include stories that would appeal to their minds and comfort their souls. The stories we have selected comprise lessons and morals for learners to learn and draw lessons from them. Because lessons and morals drawn from biographies are difficult at the preparatory level, we have selected for this course some stories from the life of the Messenger Muhammed - \mathcal{PBUH} -, without taking into account the chronological progression, but rather the focus was on situations that interest has been young children and increase their love for the Messenger Muhammed - \mathcal{PBUH} - because of the many high human qualities of his personality. This part of stories presents an alternation between chants that aim to instill values, loosen the tongue, refine the taste, and draw the young learners closer to almighty allah.

Commitment is our Path

We have included the concept of "**commitment**" within regular dialogues that allow learners to to apply and practice the values in their lifestyle. The dialogues revolve around the central headings of the different sections, mentioned before, while reinforcing the linguistic assets and an the learners acquisitions.

Our Path in reviewing materials

Given the abundance of content that learners benefit from in each educational section, we have been keen to allocate a section at the end of each unit that helps learners remember the information and acquired knowledge and review them in a funny, entertaining, and useful way.

To ease the teaching task and ensure the new book's effective use of contents, we have endeavored to provide a time distribution / framework for each educational unit to assist the teacher in managing time effeciently and effectively distributing the extensive materials in the book.

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1 The stage of basics:

- This stage covers three educational levels: Preparatory, first and second levels.
 Methodologically, this stage is built around the triangle of discovery, motivation and facilitation.
- To allow young learners to get to know the basics of Islam such as the Holy Quran, ethics, the sayings and life of the Prophet(PBUH), rituals and beliefs.
- To fortify the psychological relationship and the cultural bond between young learners and Islam by focusing on its human dimensions and its impact in their daily life.



2 The stage of specificities:

- This stage covers two educational levels: The third and fourth levels.
 Methodologically, it is built around an in depth understanding and debate while consolidating previous knowledge.
- Reinforce the general principles acquired by young learners during the stage of the basics with in depth memorization, understanding, elaboration and practice.
- Enhance the knowledge of the main pillars of Islam and belief drawing lessons from their general objectives with more emphasis on the Holy Quran and the Hadith through memorization, understanding and learning.



3 The stage of practical behavior:

- This stage covers two educational levels: The fifth and sixth levels. Given the fact that the learners reach the age of discretion, the stage focuses on the concepts of commitment and responsibility.
- Develop the skills of reflection, deduction, conclusion among the learners to enable them to distinguish between right and wrong, good and evil in order to adopt the right behavior.
- Enrich the learners' knowledge in the field of rituals and social relationships which enables them to understand the objectives of practicing their religious duties and the merit of reward and punishment.





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
